

## **Instructions and material**

#### **Materials:**

- List of items to find (one per child/team)
- Pens or pencils for checking off items
- Camera, cellphone, or tablet (optional, to document discoveries)



### Instructions:

- Use the list to check off each item you find.
- Remember not to pick or remove any items when you find them-simply observe and then cross them off the list.
- If you have multiple players, consider turning the treasure hunt into a competition: the players must either find as many items as they can within a time limit, or find all the items as quickly as possible.
- Here is how you might determine a winner in the latter case: When a player has finished finding all the items, the game is paused and that player shows the others everything they have found, either by sharing the photos they took or by leading them to the actual specimens.

- An ant at work
- Something that is your favourite colour
- Something round
