Purpose of the activity

The objective of this activity is to make your child aware that there are word associations that naturally go together.

This skill will allow your child to understand how words are formed and make connections between them both orally and in writing.

IT'S YOUR TURN TO PLAY WITH YOUR CHILD!

Explain the activity:



Together, we are going to find words that rhyme.

Explain why:



This will allow you to see that some words have the same ending.

Explain when:



When you want to rhyme words, in a poem or in a song, you can determine if the end of certain words is the same." Or "when you hear songs or poems, you will know how to recognize rhymes!


Try it together:



«You can see that I've put objects on the table. Let's pick one... The kitten!"

Kitten! Great. What is the last sound you hear in the word kitten? Kitt-en.

Kitt en





Let's name each object on the table to find out which one sounds the same at the end of the word. Ex. Hon-ey, drag-on, etc.

Hon ey Drag on

Mitt-en. Yes! Kitt-en, mitt-en. Both words end the same. We hear -en at the end of the word.

Mitt en Kitt en



Let's take another object:

Wagon! Great. What is the last sound you hear?

Wag on ooon

Do you see another object that ends like that, that sounds like -on?



Now, let's try with another object.
