SEQUENCE: DEVELOPING VOCABULARY - PRIMARY

# Purpose of the activity

The objective of this activity is to make your child aware that there are word associations that naturally go together.



## Relevance of the activity

This activity will allow your child to **better organize** words within a sentence and make the right word choices.



### **Supplies**



- Your child's list of vocabulary words
- Objects in your home





#### LET'S GO!

**Explain the activity:** 



Today we will learn how to make the right word associations.

**Explain why:** 



Knowing how to use words together will help you organize them better within a sentence. This strategy is very useful to enrich your vocabulary and make the right word choices.

**Explain when:** 



You can use this strategy every time you express an idea or opinion when speaking or writing.

**Try it together:** 



Some words just go well together: they make a good team!



Let's take the noun "plastic", for example.

Let's try to find words that can be used with this word. We could use a dictionary to help us if we ever need inspiration.

- To begin with, you might wonder **how** plastic can be or look: It can be transparent, recycled, melted, etc. Here we have found adjectives that associate well with this word.
- You might also wonder what **you can do** with plastic. It's true, it can be melted, recycled, produced, or used, for example. We could also say **that it is used to** cover or contain something. So now we've found some verbs that associate well with the word *plastic*.

Now, let's formulate a sentence by making as many associations as possible: **It is possible to produce recycled plastic** from our household waste.







# **Quick tips!**

You can do this activity orally or in writing. If you do the activity in writing, your child can write down word associations in a book as a list or make a concept map.
